


About NAC-SOYF, INC

The NAC-Save Our Youth Foundation, Inc. is a 501 (c) (3) public charity as designated by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) in December 2005. It is the philanthropic arm of the historic Norfolk (VA) Alumni Chapter which was established October 4, 1940.

Scholarship and mentoring services was started in the Chapter in 1941 by founding members of the Chapter. The late James A. Overton was appointed the chapter's first Guide Right Program Director. He would later become a Civil Right Attorney and Judge, and received Kappa alph Psi Fraternity, Inc. second highest achievement Award, the elder Watson digs Award. From the very beginning the Norfolk (VA) Alumni chapter was committed to assisting youth through scholarships and mentoring services.

Operating for six years, the NAC Save Our Youth Foundation, Inc. is the premier youth Foundation sponsored by a historic fraternity, providing scholarships and mentoring services to South Hampton Roads youth. The 501 (c) (3) provides scholarships to Hampton Roads minority youth and supports mentoring services in five Norfolk Public Schools.

Since it was established in 2005, the Foundation has provided more than \$50,000.00 in scholarships, and grants to youth and adults in Hampton Roads. With a low administrative cost, ninety-five percent (\$95) of every dollar contributed to or earned front sponsored events is used to help a youth pursue his or her goals.



Summary of Accomplishments in 2011

The NAC-Save Our Youth Foundation, Inc. completed the 2011 calendar year very successfully. Keeping its promise to use resources efficiently and effectively, the Foundation has provided scholarships to qualified and deserving high school graduates, supporting mentoring and tutoring at-risk elementary and secondary high school youth and other charitable causes.

The Foundation vision is to improve the educational, social, and economic prospect of low-income at-risk youth and adults in Southampton Roads.

The Foundation sources of funds include receipts from its Annual Black History Month community Service Awards Program, Annual Swinging for Our Youth Golf Classic, membership dues, individual and corporate donations and sponsorships

The Annual black History Month Community Service Awards Program

The 13th Annual Black History Month Community Service and Honors Program was held in the Murray Center, Norfolk, Virginia. Over 300 guests including corporate executives, Kappas, families, and youth participated in the event. The Reverend Dr. Robert A. Diggs, Sr., Pastor of Tabernacle Baptist Church, Petersburg Virginia served as the event keynote speakers. He shared with the audience "The Story of Jocko," a twelve year-old African American who sought to fight the Redcoats in 1776, but was deemed to young by General George Washington. Being to0 young to fight, General Washington in 1776 designated him to hold the lantern so that the troop who know where to return across the Delaware River after they fought the British in Trenton New Jersey. When the troops return, Jocko had frozen to death with the lantern clutched in his hand.

Washington was so moved, he commission a statue of the "Faithful Groomsman" to stand in Graves's honor at the general's estate in Mount Vernon.

The Norfolk Public Schools All City Jazz Ensemble, under the expert supervision of Steve Daley, Played some cool jazz music featuring Duke Ellington, and Cannonball

Adderley.
